Archaeology and Oral History of the Old Roach Logging Camp

Surge Dams, Slop Pits, and What to Do If You Chop Off Your Toe With a Broadaxe:
Archaeology and Oral History of the Old Roach Logging Camp, presented by Nicole Branton, Archaeologist, Arapaho and Roosevelt National Forests and Pawnee National Grassland.

The Old Roach Logging Camp was the headquarters of the Otto Lumber Company and home to many tie hacks in the last years of railroad logging ("tie hacking") in northern Colorado. Occupied between at least 1923 and 1938, Old Roach was a "real town" with a post office, school, and indoor plumbing in many homes. Yet little is known about this camp, which was destroyed at the termination of the Company's timber contract. The first season of archaeological investigations and oral history at the Old Roach Logging Camp solved many mysteries, including where the camp's trash went, how the Stuck Creek dam worked, how the family and bachelor buildings were constructed, and where the barn and water sources were located. Using historical maps, photos, and oral history testimony to interpret the archaeological remains of the camp, the Passport in Time volunteers also began mapping the extensive archaeological landscape of tie hacking camps, water

control features, and logging remains that testify to the thriving tie hack community that once occupied this remote area of the Roosevelt National Forest. Join CAS on September 20 to learn about historical archaeology, the technology of tie hacking, and one of the lost cities of the Arapaho and Roosevelt National Forests. Then, see these sites yourself on September 30 when CAS takes a field trip to Old Roach and the Stuck Creek Dam (see page 2).

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Field Trip to Old Roach Logging Camp Sept. 30

Meet at 7:00 a.m. at the CSU parking lot on the corner of Lake Street and College Avenue (it is between College and Mason and Pitkin and Lake, south of the track). Plan to carpool — just about any type of car can handle the well-developed dirt road to the site. We will return by 3 or 4 p.m. Bring lunch, water, hiking shoes of some sort, camera, LAYERS for ANY TYPE of weather. (Be prepared for rain, snow, warm weather, cold weather, etc.). Site elevation: ~10,000 feet. We will drive to the actual camp, and hike to the Stuck Creek Dam and the flume. The hikes are short and moderate - nothing too serious but there is a slight slope navigation involved and folks might get a little out of breath. Children age 18 and under are okay with a parent or guardian. Directions and a handout will be passed out after Nicole's program on September 20th.

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PAAC Class in Ceramics Begins September 26

The Program for Avocational Archeological Certification (PAAC) class Prehistoric Ceramic Description & Analysis will be offered in Fort Collins on Tuesday evenings, beginning September 26.

This course is an introduction to a major artifact class found in Colorado: ceramics. The course covers the technology of ceramic manufacture, basic description and analysis, and an introduction to some American Indian ceramic wares found in the state. The course is not a study of ceramic typology; types will be described on a limited basis, and non-Indian wares are not discussed. The course is of value to those individuals interested in the Late Prehistoric to Protohistoric period occupations (AD 150-1800) of Colorado.

Class location: CSU Laboratory of Public Archaeology (LOPA), 3136 S. Timberline Rd., Fort Collins. Assistant State Archaeologist Kevin Black will travel to Fort Collins to teach this class. This class consists of seven sessions



(20 hours), meeting on Tuesday evenings, 6:30-9:30 p.m., September 26 to November 14 (no class on October 3). We have met the minimum enrollment for this class, and there are still a few

openings. 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Colorado Archaeological Society Code of Ethics

- Members will uphold State and Federal antiquities laws and regulations.
- Excavation of archaeological sites will be conducted only according to professionally accepted procedures developed in consultation with a professional archaeologist and with the written permission of the landowner. The investigator has the responsibility for publication of the results of his/her investigation and for making the collection available for further scientific study.
- Members are encouraged to report archaeological sites to the Office on the State Site Report forms. Materials collected from the surface sites shall be catalogued and described in the site survey report. Collected materials should either be deposited with the State Archaeologist's office or made available for scientific study.
- Members will not support illegal or unscientifically conducted activities by participating in or condoning the sale, exchange or purchase of artifacts obtained from such sites.
- Members who exhibit artifacts will do so in an educational context. Items from burials and objects considered sacred will not be exhibited.
- Members will cooperate with the State Archaeologist and other agencies concerned with archaeology and related fields.
- Members will respect the dignity of groups whose cultural histories are the subject of archaeological investigation.
- Members will not participate in conduct involving dishonesty, deceit, or misrepresentation about archaeological matters.
